

STRANGERS AND SOJOURNERS



Thom Higgins (1950-1994)

Hear my prayer, O Lord, and give ear unto my cry; hold not thy peace at my tears: for I am a stranger with thee, and a sojourner, as all my fathers were. O spare me, that I may recover strength, before I go hence, and be no more. Psalm 39:12-13 (KJV)

June is Pride Month, a celebration of LGBT+ persons. The use of the word "Pride" is credited to Thom Higgins (1950-1994), a gay rights activist in Minneapolis. He is best known for throwing a pie into the face of anti-gay activist Anita Bryant (b. 1940) on live television in 1977. The origins of the use of the word "Pride" ultimately trace to the Stonewall Riots, a series of spontaneous protests in New York City by members of the gay community in response to a police raid. It occurred in the early morning hours of June 28, 1969. In 1970, there was a parade one year later to commemorate the event with signs that read "gay and proud" – and this was later changed to "pride." Hence, the phenomenon of gay pride parades spread and now occur worldwide.

The twenty-first century has seen a rapid shift in American attitudes toward the acceptance of LGBT+ persons.

Massachusetts was the first state to permit same-sex marriage based on the Supreme Judicial Court ruling in 2004. Glenview Community Church declared itself Open and Affirming in 2010. Four years later, Illinois legalized same-sex marriage and all 50 states did so in 2015 due to a Supreme Court ruling. Such changes would have been unthinkable for the protesters at Stonewall in 1969. Yet, today, "Pride" and "Pride Month" have become largely

mainstream in the United States and many other countries. Many corporations, organizations, churches, and synagogues now celebrate Pride Month. The rainbow flag and Pride Progress flag are relatively commonplace symbols nationwide, especially in urban areas.

Yet, in most of the world and in parts of our own country, the intolerance and hatred of LGBT+ persons remain common. The Republic of Uganda recently passed the "Anti-Homosexuality Act of 2023" which can result in life imprisonment for anyone convicted of same-sex relations – and in some cases, the death penalty can be imposed. The Ugandan media often refers to this law as the "Kill the Gays" law. It is so draconian that many American conservative politicians joined in denouncing the law as barbaric.

Uganda was the first country in Africa that I ever worked in – in 2004. At that time, homosexuality was illegal – a carryover from British colonial laws. But the law was rarely enforced. The very small openly LGBT+ community in Uganda had achieved a small degree of toleration. However, this has since been destroyed. The origins of this terrible law and similar laws in sub-Saharan Africa can be traced to American evangelicals who began exporting their anti-LGBT+ messaging overseas. Since their agenda had failed in the United States, these groups found a receptive audience abroad. In Uganda, this began in 2009. The result of this hateful export (done

in the name of Christianity) is the 2023 law that was passed. In other words, the origins of the current Ugandan law lie in our own country with our own citizens. It is a national tragedy.

While there have been major strides in acceptance in parts of the world, most LGBT+ folks remain "strangers and sojourners" on this earth, to quote the psalm above. The English word "stranger" originally meant "foreigner" – in Latin, the word is *alienus* or in English "alien." It literally means to be an outsider. The word "sojourner" means "wanderer" or someone who has no permanent dwelling. Most of the world's LGBT+ population are indeed aliens within their own countries, often forced to flee to save their own lives – and thus also wanderers. And their cry goes up to God: "O spare me, that I may recover strength, before I go hence, and be no more."

I suggest that during Pride Month, we might reflect on how we can align our lives with the gospel of Jesus. Our Lord would never desire anyone to be deemed a stranger or sojourner, nor want anyone to be rejected, despised, jailed, or executed for their unique humanity – including that person's sexual orientation or gender identity. We must remember that every human person bears the image of God and this gives that person sacred worth. The stern Protestant Reformer from Geneva, John Calvin (1509-1564), reminds us: "For Christ, having received, not one or two of us, but all together, has thus connected us, so that we ought to cherish one another." We are all the body of Christ, and we are commanded to love all people, even our enemies.

- 5. We Care join a team to provide meals for the ill and emergency support for the homebound by providing rides to doctor's appointments, church, shopping, etc.
- 6. Phone calls make periodic encouraging phone calls to reconnect with congregants.
- 7. Holiday flower decorations—Help beautify the sanctuary with flowers at Christmas and Easter and help coordinate delivering the flowers to shut-ins.
