

I spent the last three years in seminary contemplating with my classmates and professors (among other things) what the future of church ministry was. There we were: students, faculty and staff committed to the future of the church, our faith, and theological education. There I was dedicating years of my life to learning biblical studies, theology, and ministry skills in preparation for church ministry. In our classrooms we were engaged and energized, but there always seemed to be an elephant in the room: The church was changing. Perhaps most importantly and what seemed to be the most intimidating for the future of the church: children and young families were not in church anymore. Churches were not growing. Or so we thought. It felt like everywhere I went the narrative was the same. The church was declining. Our futures looked grim.

We surprisingly did not talk about this explicitly very often. Perhaps we were scared to name these fears aloud. But I think all my classmates probably had similar thoughts to me at some points: are we walking towards a dying church? Is the church still relevant? Is ministry still relevant? Will it be relevant in the future? Even admitting these doubts now in writing makes me want to cringe. Naming them seems to give them a life that I do not want them to have.

Every church I have ever been to can reminisce: Our sanctuary used to be full. We used to have so many kids. Oh, the choir used to be so big! I too can reminisce. My own childhood church once had a vibrant program for youth that now looks much different. I know what nostalgia feels like.

There are all sorts of theories and likely all sorts of reasons why the church looks different than it used to. We could analyze them all day if we want. We could also brainstorm all day to produce solutions to make our church more attractive and flashier to pull in new people. But I also have a different idea.


I find myself in a unique position at Glenview Community Church. I do not have any concept of what "used to be." (Other than, of course, what I am learning from the stories that people tell me.) For the most part, I only see what exists right now. I look around and I see GCC for what it is in the present without the context of what it may have been in the past. I do not reminisce or have nostalgia. (Not to mention, I am also completely new to the area, so I do not even have context for what Glenview used to be or what Chicago or Illinois used to be. It is all new to me!)

Let me tell you what can be seen from this unique point of view... Abundance! There is SO much good at GCC. There are people who are passionate about this church and about the community. There are children and youth and yes, even young families, who are here and ready to participate. There is a building that is beautiful and hospitable. There are staff who are dedicated and deeply rooted in the life of the church. There is a leadership team which is thoughtful and wise. There are ideas and energy. There is so much generosity. There is an active outreach team that regularly supports local organizations. There is a thriving Nursery school and "New to You" store. There is an active Women's Association that has a long history of providing a place for the building of meaningful relationships as well as supporting the work of the chuch. Now let me clarify something. For those of you who can reminisce about what was at GCC, I am not asking you to put that aside. We need you to help us discern what God is calling our church to be. To help revise old, revive existing, and empower and develop creative programs for the future of our church.

But the story we tell matters. The story of Glenview Community Church is a story of abundance. So, tell that story. Tell the story of what you see that is good and plentiful right now. This is the story that I see and will continue telling of Glenview Community Church. I hope you will join me!
