2 Corinthians 9:8~ And God is able to provide you with every blessing in abundance, so that by always having enough of everything, you may share abundantly in every good work.

"More Than Enough: *Celebrating Glenview Community Church's Past, Present & Future...*"

How does a church measure success? Is it by the number of bodies in the pews? Is it by the number of pledges collected? Is it by the size of a building or the number of staff? How does a church measure success? Is it by the vitality of its programs? The quality of its music? The outreach that it does? The amount of money that it gives away? How does a church measure success? This is not just a rhetorical question. It is a question that we should ponder. One that I don't know the answer to. I want to believe that a church's success is none of these things. Perhaps we should measure a church's success by something more spiritual. Are those who are engaged in the church drawn closer to God, each other, themselves, and creation? Are those who are engaged in the church sent out empowered each week to live like Christ in the world?

I wonder if when we start looking for ways to measure the success of a church, we are looking for the wrong thing. Perhaps the goal of a church was never to be "successful" but to be an embodiment of heaven on earth, to be a sacred space, a space set apart, where things are done differently, where love abounds, where success is not measured in the way we might be tempted to measure it.

How does a church measure success?

People often point to Acts 4:32-35 to describe the vision Rev. Abigail Lutz of the church, "Now the whole group of those who believed were of one heart and soul, and no one claimed

private ownership of any possessions, but everything they owned was held in common. With great power the apostles gave their testimony to the resurrection of the Lord Jesus, and great grace was upon them all. There was not a needy person among them, for as many as owned lands or houses sold them and brought the proceeds of what was sold. They laid it at the apostles' feet, and it was distributed to each as any had need." There is a reason this passage is referenced again and again. While "church" as we know it was nowhere on the apostle's radar, it is a beautiful description of the potential of community. Even this passage though, I don't think was intended to be a benchmark to measure success.

I am convinced that the abundance we have is simply not measurable. We at Glenview Community Church have "More Than Enough". This is true, NOT because of the physical assets we have, or the monetary reserves we have, or the pledge benchmark we do or don't reach. It isn't even true because of the AMAZING community we have of talented and dedicated individuals. Our Abundance, our Plenty, our "More Than Enough", comes from a divine, unconditional love and grace poured out freely for each and every one of us and for all those who surround us (including those who may never step foot inside our church building). This is The Plenty that we have to celebrate at GCC. We can celebrate the More Than Enough of our Past, Present, and Future. It is an unchanging abundance that comes from a source much more consistent than any measurement of success.

I have loved celebrating, and look forward to continuing to celebrate, this abundance with you.

CONFIRMATION CLASS INTERFAITH TRIP TO ISMAILI CENTER

The 7th and 8th grade students of Glenview Community Church's confirmation class, along with students from Glenview United Methodist Church, were warmly welcomed to the Ismaili Jamatkhana ("Community Space") on February 4. Confirmation class is a chance for our students to learn more about what it means to be a Christian, the process ends with students "confirming" their faith and officially joining the church as members. At our church we believe part of understanding Christianity is understanding that we live in a world and in a community with many religious traditions. Talking with our students about how we engage with people of different faiths and modeling a posture of understanding and learning is a crucial part of our two-year curriculum.

We received a tour of the building and learned about the many programs that happen in the center. We ended our morning together by taking off our shoes to enter the sacred prayer room. After exploring the room on our own we gathered in a circle in the center of the room and sat on the carpeted floor to learn more about what happens in this sacred space, how prayer works, and some of what defines the Ismaili faith. We learned about the role that Glenview Clergy played in supporting the building of the center when there was some push back against it. We are thankful to have relationships with the many faiths that worship, gather, and build community in Glenview.

For our students, learning about different religious traditions is important in helping us reflect on our own faith. We were looking, not for differences, but for what unites us.

Generosity and service is an important part of being a member at Glenview Community Church. Welcome to "Healthy Hints" for March! To reach the proverbial Pot 'O Gold at the end of the Rainbow in health, I thought we might touch upon the many benefits of "Eating the Rainbow."

Our plant-based-foods naturally come in a variety of colors, not just to be aesthetically pleasing. These different colored fruits and vegetables serve a purpose in our

diets by containing essential phytonutrients for optimal health.

Here are a few health benefits from each food color category and some food examples:

Red – Improved inflammation, lower risk of heart disease, improved brain function (eggplant, beets, radishes, red onion, tomatoes, cranberries, pomegranates, rhubarb, watermelon).

Orange – Hormone regulation, reproductive health, skin, hair and vision health (carrots, pumpkins, sweet potatoes, winter squash, apricots, cantaloupe, mango, oranges).

Yellow – Digestive health, metabolism (fermented cabbage, garlic, ginger, turmeric, yellow peppers, bananas, peaches, pineapples, lemons, grapefruit).

Green – Heart health, circulation (artichokes, arugula, asparagus, broccoli, celery, avocado, green grapes, honeydew, kiwifruit, limes).

Blue/Purple – Brain health, mood support (black olives, eggplant, purple cabbage, purple cauliflower, blackberries, blueberries, purple grapes, Acai, black currants).

"Eating the Rainbow" is an easy way to be intentional about including more phytonutrients in your diet. Have fun with it and ask your grocer where to find certain foods if you need help.
